

Spokane Wildfire Resources

If you are in or near an evacuation area, please stay alert, follow all evacuation orders, and monitor conditions closely through official sources.

Know Your Evacuation Level

- **Level 1 – Be Ready:** Stay informed and prepare to leave if conditions worsen. Pack a "go bag" with medications, important documents, water, food, cash, clothing, pet supplies, and other essentials. Make a plan for your family and pets.
- **Level 2 – Be Set:** There is a significant danger to your area. Be prepared to leave at a moment's notice. Load your vehicle, gather family members and pets, and consider leaving now—especially if you have mobility challenges, medical needs, young children, or large animals.
- **Level 3 – Go Now:** Leave immediately. Do not delay to gather belongings or protect your property. Follow evacuation routes and instructions from emergency officials. Return only when authorities declare it is safe.

- Community members affected by the fires may use YMCA locations Monday–Friday, 8:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m. for showers and support spaces.

- Emergency drop-in childcare for children ages 4 and older

- Monday–Friday, 11:00 a.m.–3:00 p.m.

Second Harvest Inland Northwest

- Emergency food assistance is available as response efforts continue.

Pet & Animal Assistance

- **SpokAnimal** may be able to assist with displaced small pets depending on capacity.
- **SCRAPS** is coordinating animal assistance and lost/found pet reports.
- **Spokane County Fair & Expo Center** is sheltering horses, livestock, and other large animals.
- **HEART Spokane (Humane Evacuation Animal Rescue Team)** is assisting with animal evacuations as resources allow.

When evacuating with pets, bring food, medications, leashes, carriers, and vaccination records if possible.

If you receive Washington food or cash assistance and lost food or essential items because of the fires, call **1-877-501-2233** to ask about replacement benefits and emergency assistance.

If you need replacement medications, medical equipment, oxygen, mobility assistance, or disability accommodations, notify Red Cross shelter staff immediately.

How You Can Help

- Check on neighbors, especially older adults, people with disabilities, and families who may need assistance.

After the Fire

If your home or property has been damaged:

- Contact your insurance company as soon as it is safe.
- Photograph damage before cleaning up.
- Save receipts for emergency expenses.
- Keep a list of damaged belongings.
- Do not return home until authorities say it is safe.
